Q. How did you get started painting?

A. I first started painting in 1991. I couldn't find anyone to go to painting classes with me, so I decided to go by myself. My first classes were held at a junior high school at night. The class was called "Tole Painting 101." The teacher was terrific. She taught us everything starting with which brushes to get to how to clean and

take care of them. She taught us about all the supplies we would need to get started and how to use them. Then we learned how to prep a piece of wood: sand, seal, and sand again. We learned how to apply paint and how to float, stipple, line, highlight, shade--everything. We started on our piece by base coating and then applying the pattern. The next meeting we did all the details. It was a very basic class but she taught us all we needed to start painting. The artists that we usually painted were Gaye Shoell, Fayette Skinner, Mary Ellen Gould, and a few others.

I remember one day I was at Lewards craft store in the paint department when I met a very nice lady who told me about a painting chapter here in Las Vegas. She invited me to come check it out. This was in 1995 and the nice lady was none other than our Shayron Monahan, who has remained my best friend ever since.

- **Q.** What is your favorite medium?
- **A.** My favorite medium is acrylic although I have begun to paint with oils as well.

- **Q.** Who is your favorite designer?
- **A.** My favorite was Gaye Shoell. She still remains one of my favorites today.
- Q. What do you enjoy painting?
- **A.** My favorite holiday is Halloween so, of course, I paint a lot of Halloween stuff, although I enjoy painting other things as well.
- Q. What do you enjoy doing when you're not painting?
- **A.** One of the things I love to do when I'm not painting is shopping at thrift stores, antique stores, garage sales, and looking for fun and unique things to paint on. I also enjoy the outdoors including camping, fishing, and hiking especially with my family and friends.
- Q. What are your painting goals?
- **A.** I would really like to learn how to paint all different kinds of beautiful roses, learn how to mix colors and paint better with oils, I'm still a beginner with oils.

Special Raffle for SSTDP Members



Each time you attend a meeting, put your name on a ticket into a special basket for this raffle. At the end of the year, one ticket will be drawn from that basket and the winner will go home with this Dresden Plate quilt and blanket box.

The quilt was made in the 1930s from fabrics that were available at the time. The prints were very popular and now there is a movement to reprint those original fabric prints - a.k.a. 1930s fabrics.

I found a blanket box among the items donated by the estate of Pat Pillen and thought the quilt would be wonderful paired with the box.

Sharon Shuster suggested this special raffle. I had a fabulous prize, Sharon had an idea, and voila!

This twin/full quilt was pieced and quilted by Bess Lillard Odom, circa 1902 - 1991, a first generation American of German immigrants, an avid quilter and dear friend of my late grandmother, Minnie Mitchell, who was also a first generation American of German parents.

Bess and her older sister, Eva (pronounced Evee), married twin brothers Bud and Iler Odom. The 4 Odoms and my late grandparents had many, many memorable adventures together auto-camping in and around Oklahoma, New Mexico, Arkansas, and Colorado from the late 1920s until the mid-1950s.

The men in the group of friends died by the early 1970s, and in 1976 Bess and Eva gifted the quilt to my husband and me as a wedding gift.

The quilt was probably machine-pieced and is hand-quilted. It is valued between \$400 - 600.
